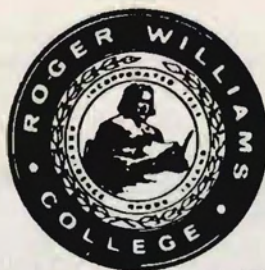
This publication written by the students for the students and administrative officers can be a great one.

## Expansion at R. W. C.

### First Satellite Campus Set At Hartford

#### I BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE

In March, 1967, a high-rise building in the Hartford Park Housing Project, located off Route 6 in Providence, R. I. was closed because of vandalism. The building was evacuated and has been unoccupied since that time. For the past year Roger Williams College officials have been studying the possibility of establishing a modest satellite campus at this project, with students and professional staff, in the hopes of making a contribution towards the identification of solutions to problems in urban low-cost housing developments and providing a field laboratory for students in the social sciences. The college would have a threefold objective in beginning a satellite campus at this location:

1. To provide our students with a stimulating educational and personal experience.
2. To contribute to the community in whatever ways it developed that we could best contribute.
3. To assemble factual data on the basis of the college's experience at Hartford Park that would be useful to city and federal officials, as well as to the academic community.

### Council Elections To Be Held

This year's Student Council elections promise to be the most exciting ever. Rumor has it that the Dean of Students' Office has been besieged by students inquiring about election procedure.

Here is a first hand report on election procedure for the coming year. There will be twenty-one representatives, seven from each class with the breakdown as follows:

The student with the highest vote total in each curriculum will represent his class and area of study. The next four students with the highest vote totals will be representatives-at-large.

officials, as well as to the academic community.

#### II WHAT THE PLAN ENTAILS AND WHAT IS NEEDED

The college plans to begin the campus with a group of about 50 students, who together with three professional staff members would live at Hartford Park. In the beginning the students would take two six-semester hour seminars at the housing project, and the remainder of their courses at the main campus of Roger Williams College. The high-rise building contains sixty-three bedroom units, of which the college would occupy twenty-four.

The college has employed an independent consulting firm to determine the project's feasibility. Extensive interviews have also been conducted with residents of the area, as well as police authorities, representatives of the Providence Housing Authority and state and federal officials. On the basis of the information at hand, a decision has been made to begin operation at Hartford Park in September, 1968.

The college's involvement would continue as long as there was a valid educational goal in sight — perhaps three or four years.

A concrete proposal has been prepared and approved by the college's Board of Trustees, as well as by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, which has agreed to underwrite a portion of the project. It has developed, however, that it will be necessary to charge the students who participate in the Hartford Project a tuition fee of \$1650 in order to cover costs. The fee, together with a room rental of \$840 per year, amounts to a total cost per student of \$2,490, excluding board, transportation and miscellaneous expenses. Many students interested in the experiment, we have found, are not able to afford the expenses. The college is therefore seeking financial assistance in the amount of \$50,000 from private sources in order to make the project economically feasible for the students.

### Open Letter To All Students

To all the New and Old Students; Welcome to Roger Williams College, on behalf of the Student Council. Everyone connected with the College is here to help and serve your needs. The College is small enough to allow a real opportunity for you to get to know your fellow students and to become active within the College.

Our Student Government was recently revised so that there would be larger representation of the student body. It is my hope that you, as persons, or as a class, will take an active part in this organization or any of the other organizations within the College. This will insure its success. Together we can make it, and I'm sure that we will.

As President of the Student Council, I feel that all students should have a chance to ask questions, express their opinions and thoughts of the school and the Student Council.

This would provide college spirit, enthusiasm, and cooperation among the student-body. Recommendations could be made to the faculty and Administration on matters concerning student-body welfare.

With this in mind I have set up monthly meetings open to the whole student-body, for the reasons stated above.

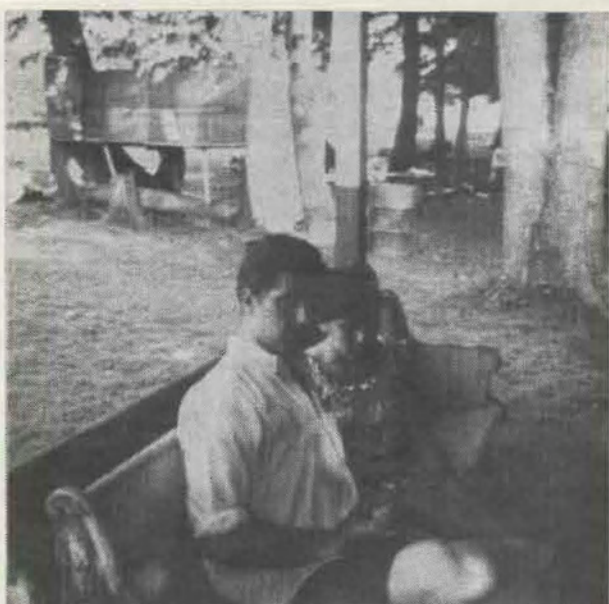

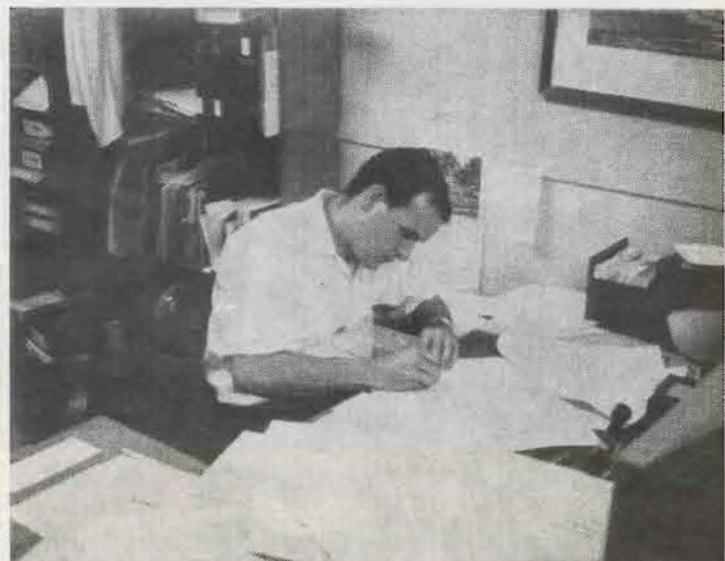

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# A Special Freshman Learns by Experience

On behalf of the *Quill*, I would like to extend a special welcome to a great new Freshman, Frank Trudell.

Frank has been awarded the Purple Heart three times while serving eleven months in Vietnam and is now waiting for his retirement from the Marines. He entered the service in December of 1965 at the age of seventeen and went to Vietnam for the first time in 1966. Frank received his first injury on July 4, 1967. He suffered mortar wounds of the legs and arms. After recovering from this, Frank volunteered to go back on the front lines. He wasn't back a month when he received grenade wounds of his shoulder and arm. This still didn't stop this great American. Frank volunteered for the third time to once again lead his company at point into the fighting zone.

On November 21, 1967, three months after returning to the battle zone, Frank received serious bullet wounds to his right leg. Be-

cause of this, Frank's time in Vietnam came to an end and he was flown back to the States on December 13, 1967.

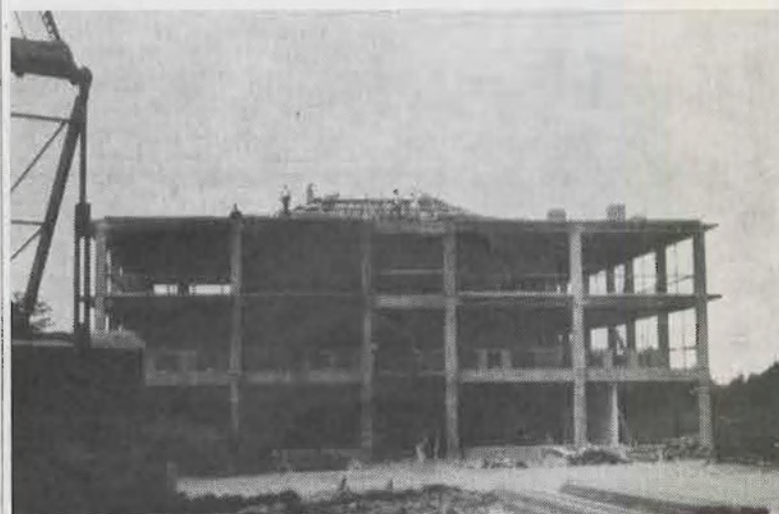
It is quite obvious that Frank Trudell is deeply moved and committed to the Foreign Affairs of today. He will supply the *Quill* with many important and interest-

## My Experience in Viet-Nam

Our stand in Vietnam is not an easy thing to explain. There are so many aspects, both fact and fallacy to this situation that for the most part, people don't understand what has and is happening in this small country that lies surrounded by the South China Sea, Laos, Cambodia, and Thailand.

The purpose of this continuous column is to familiarize the readers with all the facts considering this long and costly crisis.

The main question that most readers of current events ask is "Why are we fighting this war that concerns only the Vietnamese people and how is this related to our interest"? First of all, North and South Vietnam are not the only countries involved here. The North is soliciting and receiving the economic and military aid of several communist nations including Russia, Communist China, North Korea, and Czechoslovakia. Aiding The Republic of Vietnam (South Vietnam), are nearly all the non-communist countries of the world (at least morally). The countries that aid her economically and militarily are The United States, Australia, South Korea, and The Republic of the Philippines.

Secondly, our national interest is affected in that the entire world, both communist and non-communist are testing our reliability and guts in backing a country that has requested our help. As the leader of the free world, we cannot stand by and let a country that desires to remain free be overrun.

Some people argue that we are not fighting communism in Vietnam, that the struggle is really a nationalist revolution. This is not true. We have absolute proof that this is a naked aggression by North Vietnam. The first NVA regiment entered the South in 1964 before there were any American combat troops involved or even on the scene. The North expected that the South would fall into its lap after the French pull-out in 1954 but the Diem Government did so well in organizing the country that by 1957 they were in better condition than the North both economically and in nation building. At about this point, subversion was started. In 1964, when this proved too slow, the NVA invaded the South and they now have between 50,000 and 60,000 troops in South Vietnam. Moreover, there is now little difference between the Viet Cong (V.C.) units and the North Vietnamese Army (NVA) regular units. Both are commanded by Hanoi. Recruitment is now so hard that now V.C. units are being reinforced by NVA regulars.

Under these circumstances, I believe that if Ho Chi Minh says "Stop the war" it will stop. Such a war is not a Nationalist Revolution and therefore it is the duty of not only the United States, but of the entire world to stand up against this atrocity.

Maybe this is considered flag-waving. If it is, then I consider it an honor to be among the thousands who think that it is about time that somebody waved it.
