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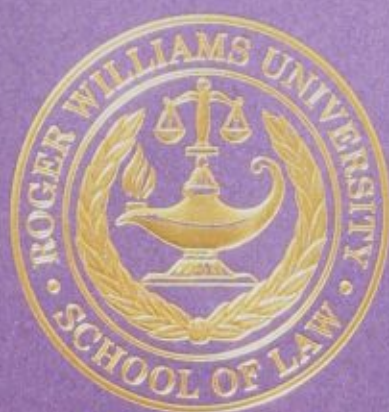

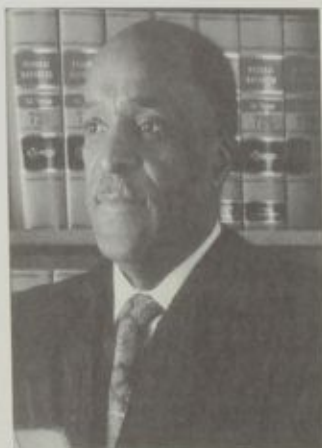

THE HONORABLE NATHANIEL R. JONES



Nathaniel R. Jones has established a reputation as a champion of civil rights and a staunch defender of the U.S. Constitution. He was appointed to the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals by President Carter in 1979. He has vigorously enforced the principles and tenets that animate our Constitution over the past twenty-two years.

Born in 1926, Judge Jones received his A.B. and law degree from Youngstown State University in 1951 and 1955 respectively. He began his career as Executive Director of the Fair Employment Practices Commission in Youngstown in 1956, then as Assistant U.S. Attorney from 1961 to 1967. After a brief stint in private practice, his commitment to protecting civil rights began in 1969 as General Counsel for the NAACP. During his tenure as General Counsel, he worked tirelessly and was at the front line of many civil rights struggles that shaped the modern era. In his years at the NAACP, Judge Jones

coordinated the attack against northern school segregation and twice argued before the United States Supreme Court in the Detroit school case, Bradley v. Milliken. He was also a leader on issues such as affirmative action, racial discrimination in the military, and the right to protest under the First Amendment.

Judge Jones has had a long-standing commitment to education and public service. He was named adjunct professor at the University of Cincinnati College of Law in 1983, a position he still holds today. He has served as Co-Chairman of the Constitutional Rights Committee of the American Bar Association, and as Chairman of the Civil Rights Section of the Federal Bar Association, and as a member of the National Conference of Black Lawyers. He has published extensively on subjects such as school desegregation and civil rights.

His commitment to rule of law is not confined to the United States. He has served as a member of the Judicial International Relations Committee of the U.S. Judicial Conference and in 1985, Judge Jones traveled to South Africa on behalf of the Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights Under Law. While in South Africa, Judge Jones received considerable international attention when he attended a treason trial and was arrested for violation of apartheid laws. In 1994, Judge Jones returned to South Africa as Co-Chair for the Lawyers' Committee Observer Team to observe the first-ever South Africa democratic elections.

On the bench, the Judge's rulings have been marked with legal reasoning married to compassion and justice. In a landmark case of eight thousand women who settled a sex discrimination suit against the Tennessee Valley Authority for five million dollars, he held that the plaintiffs did not have to pay taxes on the award. The settlement came after the women claimed that they were paid less than the men in comparable jobs. The Internal Revenue Service had argued that the payments were taxable as delayed wages. Judge Jones held that the award was compensation for personal injuries and was, therefore, not taxable.

More recently, in the 1999 case, Walton v. Hammons, Jones held that the amendments to the Food Stamp Act and to the public assistance system effected by the 1996 Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act do not authorize states to terminate the food stamp benefits of an entire household as a sanction for one member's failure to cooperate in establishing the paternity of child or children in the household.

Judge Jones has received numerous awards, including honorary degrees from many universities such as William Mitchell College of Law and the City University of New York, School of Law at Queens College. He has also received the National Bar Association Equal Justice Award, the Peace of the City Award from the Jewish Community Relations Council, and he has been recognized as one of the "Great Living Cincinnatians" by the Chamber of Commerce.

Judge Jones, your unwavering commitment to public service, your dedication to preserving the civil liberties of not only Americans, but people around the world, and your compassion for justice, serve as an example for all of our graduates here today, and we are honored to award you this Doctor of Laws, honoris causa.

Given this nineteenth day of May, two thousand and one.

For more than half a century, Robert Brydon Kent has graced the halls of some of the country's finest law schools, including three years as a distinguished visiting professor here at Roger Williams University School of Law. He has devoted his life to guiding the careers of thousands of law students and continues to teach law as a visiting professor at his alma mater, Boston University School of Law, 53 years after he earned his law degree there.

After earning his A.B. from Harvard University in 1943, Professor Kent enlisted in the Army as a private, leaving three years later as a first lieutenant. He earned his law degree, cum laude, in 1948 from Boston University, where he served as Editor-in-Chief of the Law Review.



After two years in private practice in Ware, Massachusetts, Professor Kent returned to Boston University School of Law as an instructor, assistant professor, and then full professor. During his thirty-one years of service at Boston University, Professor Kent left briefly in 1960 and 1961 to be a Ford Fellow in Law Teaching at Harvard Law School and in 1973 and 1974 to be a Visiting Professor at Harvard Law School. In 1981, Professor Kent left Boston for Ithaca, New York to serve as professor at the Cornell University Law School. While at Cornell, he held the post of Associate Dean of Academic Affairs for four years, and in 1992 was named Professor Emeritus. Professor Kent continues to teach at Cornell's Summer Institute of International and Comparative Law in Paris.

In addition to his dedication to American legal education, Professor Kent has also devoted himself to the education of lawyers in Africa. He was both a professor and dean of the University of Zambia School of Law from 1970 to 1972. While in Zambia, he was also the Director of the Law Practice Institute for Zambia's Council of Legal Education. Professor Kent returned to the University of Zambia in 1988 as a Fulbright Professor.

Professor Kent has received many awards, including a Peace Corps Citation in 1996 for the "Lawyers in Africa" Program; the Class of 1979 Award for Excellence in Law Teaching from Boston University School of Law; and also in 1979, the Boston University Alumni Association Award for Distinguished Service to the School of Law.

Outside the classroom, Professor Kent has contributed to the advancement of the law by serving as the Reporter for the Committee of Civil Rules of the Supreme, Superior and District Courts of Rhode Island. He has also served as the Reporter on Juvenile Court Rules for the Family Court of Rhode Island. His expertise on the rules of civil procedure of the State of Rhode Island culminated in the publication of his seminal work on the topic, *Rhode Island Practice*, in 1969.

Professor Kent has also served his community by being a Representative Town Meeting Member and Selectman for Lexington, Massachusetts. He is a member of numerous boards of directors including the Board of Trustees of Kimball Union Academy of Meriden, New Hampshire from which he graduated in 1939. Professor Kent is the devoted husband of Barbara Tuttle Kent and the much-loved father of four and grandfather of three.

At Roger Williams Law School, Professor Kent has been a steady hand and a resource for students, faculty, and staff alike. His is a voice of calm, reason, and compassion that has been invaluable to us all.

Professor Kent, you have shared your wisdom with thousands of law students, including today's graduates of the Roger Williams University Ralph R. Papitto School of Law. You have been and continue to be a mentor for your colleagues on the faculty at the School of Law and you have served the School of Law in countless other ways. You will forever be an essential part of this school's proud history and we are honored to award you with this Doctor of Laws, honoris causa.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Academic dress originated more than 600 years ago at the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, where today, the most colorful gowns in the world are those worn at Oxford functions. Though worn daily in the Middle Ages to identify disciplines of study and to provide warmth, today, academic regalia is reserved for ceremonial occasions.

In the United States, the Academic Costume Code is adhered to by virtually all American colleges and universities. This governs the material, style, color and trimmings of the gown and hood, the style of the cap, and the color of the tassel.

The field of learning in which the degree was awarded is indicated by the color of the edging of the hood, and in some cases by the color of the velvet trimming on the front panels and the sleeves. The doctor's gown, which may be worn open or closed, has velvet panels draped around the neck and along the front edges of the gown. Three horizontal bars are stitched on the upper arm of the full, bell-shaped sleeves. The standard academic color for law is purple.

This established code allows viewers to determine from the costume the degree, academic discipline and, often, the institution that awarded the degree. The gown of the Roger Williams University School of Law is black with black velvet trimming on each sleeve. The hood has a velvet border of purple with a satin lining of a gold background with a blue chevron. The cap, or tam, is worn with a gold tassel.
