

For those who have not used the CD-ROMs since last year, there will be some surprises. Many titles have



Rhode Island* CD-ROM. Other *L.O.I.S.* databases contain United States Supreme Court opinions and opinions from the First Circuit Court of Appeals.


familiar with WESTLAW will find the West Rhode Island Library software very familiar, if slightly less powerful, and will have no problems using this product.

Documents and Publications*, *Matthew Bender Authority* titles, and the *Oxford English Dictionary 2d*. For reinforcing legal concepts that you are studying, try a *CALI* exercise. You can select from nearly one-hundred interactive computer-based lessons in twenty-three subject areas. *Canadian Case Digest* is a comprehensive encyclopedia of Canadian case law and *Canadian Statutes*


