RWU plays host to Senate candidates

As the 2006 midterm election edges closer, Rhode Island's highly competitive US Senate race is drawing to a close.

Republican incumbent Lincoln Chafee and his Democratic challenger Sheldon Whitehouse are making their final appeals to Rhode Island

Roger Williams University students had chances this week to meet the candidates and voice their concerns about issues surrounding the upcoming election. Whitehouse spoke last Tuesday to students and community members in the Mary Tefft White Cultural Center. Chafee was scheduled to appear there on

The College Democrats greeted Whitehouse with campaign signs and cheers as he made his way across the quad toward the library. The College Republicans stood opposite the Democrats, holding signs that read "Keep Chafee" and chanting "Six more years."

Democrats responded.

According to participants, the students from each side remained civil.

After Whitehouse arrived, some of the Republicans attended the speech to hear what he had to say.


Whitehouse addressed several issues during his visit, including the war in Iraq, affordable health care for all Americans, a need for change in the current government and retirement security.


Whitehouse sharply criticized the Republican Senate for not pressuring the Bush administration to compose a strategy that would allow troops to safely leave Iraq. He echoed Democrat Senator Jack Reed's belief that retreating from Iraq should be a process, not an immediate move-

Whitehouse suggested that it would take approximately-six months for military leaders to design a safe exit routine for the

Different Chameleon Club policies create less transports, some chaos

Changes revisited by students, administration

Among many students, Chameleon Club is held in some of the highest regards, however the safety precautions regarding the event were reevaluated last

According to administration, new approaches were taken due to the rising number of alcohol related transports that were occuring.

The goals of the new approaches were to provide a safer environment for students and to lower the number of alcohol-related transports.

Transports dropped from five at the September Chameleon Club

Stargate's cancellation a gallactic mistake

Stargate fans express upset at cancellation

On August 14, 2006, the Sci-Fi TV series Stargate: SG-1 aired its 200 episode and made TV history by becoming the longest-running consecutive Sci-Fi TV series in North America.

The Sci-Fi Channel made quite possibly one of its biggest public relations blunders in not just announcing that it was cancelling the show and not renewing it for an eleventh season, but also announcing it as it aired and the show's cast and crew were celebrating.

Fans instantly lashed out at the network's appalling timing, and some people on various message boards were even begging their moderators to let them use profanity just once to express their shock, anger and frustration.

Accusations were already flying that the Sci-Fi Channel only let the series go this far to this record-breaking milestone just so they could boast about it in the future.

Those accusations may not be far from the truth. Even the additional announcement that the spin-off series Stargate: Atlantis would be renewed for a fourth season was not enough to assuage the fans' anger.

The series, based on the 1994 feature film Stargate, made its debut on Showtime

in 1997. Showtime hosted the series for its first five seasons, and the Sci-Fi Channel picked it up from its sixth season onwards.

From seasons one through eight, the series starred Richard Dean Anderson (best known as MacGuyver) as Jack O'Neill, Michael Shanks as Daniel Jackson, Amanda Tapping as Samantha Carter, Christopher Judge as Teal'c, and Don S. Davis as George Hammond. For Season 6, while Shanks left the show for a while, Corin Nemec replaced him as a different character named Jonas Quinn.

The series was essentially reinvented with season nine, even though it was supposed to end with season eight, which culminated in the downfall of threats like the Goa'uld and the Replicators, the deaths or other removals of many secondary characters, and effectively closing major plot-lines.

Anderson left the show, to be replaced by Ben Browder as Cameron Mitchell and Beau Bridges as Hank Landry. Claudia Black guest-starred some of the time as Vala Mal Doran before finally becoming a regular cast member in Season 10. (Farscape fans will recognize Browder and Black from that particular series.)

Fans have essentially been split from the start of Season nine as to whether or not they like this new era of the SG-1 series, and tend to cite various reasons such as RDA's departure, the new villains (the god-like Ori and their priest-like Priors and other followers), how the show seems to have gone on for too long (or "jumped the shark" as they say), and various other reasons.

However, the majority of the show's fanbase remains very supportive, and these fans have even created their own 'Save Stargate SG-1' website: http://www.savestargatesgl.com Anyone interested in trying to save the show and see an 11th season or maybe a movie or two to wrap up the plot with the Ori should go there for details on who to write to, what to do, etc. MGM itself wants to see the series go on, since it is its most successful franchise after the James Bond franchise, and is doing what it can to help out.

The Sci-Fi Channel, whose president is Bonnie Hammer, has NBC as its parent company. The NBC Executive VP of Original Programming, Mark Stern, said the decision to cancel it was not based on ratings, but that he wanted the SG-I series to go out on a high note. However, he was adamant about not allowing MGM to take

it elsewhere, citing how it's forbidden in their contract with MGM.

NBC and the Sci-Fi Channel may have their reasons for doing this, as infuriating as they may be, but as the old saying goes, "actions speak louder than words," and their action to announce the cancellation when they did was not received kindly by the fans. To quote Mitchell (Browder) from the 200 episode: "Never underestimate your audience, they are generally sensitive, intelligent people who respond positively to quality entertainment."

The Sci-Fi Channel and NBC may want to heed those words closely in the future

CLUB: Administration hopeful for future of event

"I'm not saying 11 p.m. is the magic bullet," said King. "We will revisit that for next time and continue to fine-tune it."

According to King, he will work with CEN and Student Programs and Leadership on the issue well into the future. They will discuss the positives and negatives of early entry.

However, the danger of the line will definitely be addressed for the next event.

"We feel badly for students who felt like they were in danger," said King. "We'll be changing the way the line is formed and heads to the front door."

However, on the night of the event, due to the cooperation of students, Bristol Police, and public safety, they were able to split the line in half and reduce pressure.

"Although the line surged at 11, we got everyone in by 11:20 p.m.," King said.

Bristol police officers were hired on detail, and some were called in at about 11 p.m. to manage the line.

Although there were approximately 800 to 1000 students in line, the police officers were able to split the line and efficiently handle the situation.

The event reached maximum capacity (about 2100), however, the event had died down much earlier than usual.

"We had to end at 1:30 a.m. because everyone had left," said CEN member and Chameleon Club chair Rory Richards.

Some students however, did not feel the appraoch was effective.

"People were still drunk," Ahni Mooradian said. "I didn't notice much of a difference. They just started drinking earlier I suppose."

According to Mooradian, she was not patted down or searched before she entered the event.

According to King, faculty and public safety randomly chose students to pat down just like at all the other Chameleon Clubs.

Other students agreed.

"I personally thought the chaos outside was worse, but there were less arrests and transport," said Richards. "People only want to dance for a short time and by making the doors close earlier, they still danced the same amount of time they wanted to dance and then got out of their earlier."

The future of the event will be decided in the following months. Although statistically the night went better than the previous Chameleon Club, administration and CEN recognized that there were still things to work out.

"The administration is still figuring out what went well and what didn't, but I know if they do close early again, things will be done differently and hopefully a little more safely and organized."





With the Mid-term election just around the corner, both voters and pundits are following some of the hottest races raging on the political battlefield. With the House and the Senate both up for grabs, one race being looked at with great interest is the Chafee/Whitehouse senatorial race.

From a national assessment, many have projected Whitehouse as being the hands-down victor. This recent generalization, made popular by the mainstream media, is perhaps due to the anti-incumbency mucking up the beltway. In a recent Pew research poll, a whopping 45 percent of those polled believe that Congress is unproductive. The same poll has 27 percent not wanting incumbents re-elected. With the rising criticism against the Bush administration and the Iraq war losing popularity, many see control in Congress going to the Democrats.

But from a deeper perspective, the odds for Whitehouse are much different. In a recent MSNBC poll released in early October, the favorability of the two candidates are in a dead heat, with both at 47 percent. Because of this, many see Chafee as having a fighting chance. In the same poll, conducted by Mason-Dixon Polling & Research, Chafee is at 41 percent only one percentage point - being Democratic hopeful Whitehouse.

Poll numbers aside, what could make a man, running as a Republican in the blue-state of Rhode Island, so likeable to voters? According to Reuters, "Chafee is stressing his unique brand of Republicanism - from championing environmental issues to fighting Bush's tax cuts, pressing for direct talks with Iran, opposing Bush's Supreme Court nominee and even voting against Bush in the 2004

Many commentators, such as political analyst and former Clinton advisor Dick

Morris, see moderation as Chafee's appeal.

"Chaffee is an anachronism - a liberal Republican in a heavily Democratic state - really a holdover from the days of Republican patrician Newport based domination of the state's elite," Morris said. In a private interview, Morris also underscored the class of republican Chafee is in. "He is the ultimate RINO (Republican in Name Only). But when the pressure is on, he usually caves in and follows the party leadership."

This, according to the New York Times, makes Chafee "one of the few steadfast centrists among the mostly conservative Senate Republican ranks: He differs with his party leadership more often than any other Republican senator, opposing the war in Iraq and breaking ranks on a variety of environmental, economic and social issues."

As for Whitehouse, many political analysts see his platform as almost identical to Chafee's. According to OnTheIssues.org, a non-partisan web site specializing in candidate voting information, both candidates agree on the hot-button issues such as federal funding for health care and citizenship for illegal immigrants.

This begs the question: How are the two men different? According to Southern New England newspaper The Call, "If you charted them both on a series of issues and ideologies, Chafee and Whitehouse would

likely occupy almost the same exact space. If they were both in the Senate voting on the same bills, I would wager their voting records would be remarkably similar. There isn't much in their personal stories or upbringing that sets them apart from one another, either."

This leads to one key difference, the "Bush Factor." According to a USA Today Gallup state election poll, 48 percent of likely voters say they are more likely to vote for a candidate who opposes Bush...a trend which Whitehouse hopes to capital-

According to the Associated Press, Whitehouse "repeatedly used the president and the Republican Party to hammer Sen. Lincoln Chafee in their second TV debate" going so far as to say that "Chafee's focus on corruption is "from the Karl Rove playbook," referring to the Republican political strategist.

So far, this has proven to be Whitehouse's only trump card. Because both candidates belief systems are so closely aligned, Whitehouse has had no choice but to scrutinize Chafee for being a moderate. But following this Whitehouse media blitz, many critics in the media see this as a thinly-discussed ploy to differentiate the ideology.

"Whitehouse's campaign is aimed almost entirely at tying Chafee to Bush, despite the fact that Chafee breaks with the president more than perhaps any other

Republican senator," Rick Klein, a journalist for the Boston Globe, wrote in an article on the campaign. "Whitehouse is trying to tap into anti-war and anti-Bush sentiments, and that may be his best chance to knock off an incumbent who remains popular with his constituents."

Meanwhile, Chafee's ads have demonstrated a lot less vitriol.

According to the New York Times, "Chafee's campaign has tried to focus voters on the areas on which he has expressed his independence from the Republican Party, pointing particularly to his votes against the tax cuts promoted by Bush, the war in Iraq and the prescription drug care

So where does that leave the candi-

With less than one week out, there only lies one remaining factor: the voter. Although at press time Chafee is trailing by varying points poll to poll, here is something to consider: a recent Washington Post article talked about Chafee-like candidates and their middleof-the-road mentality in today's political

The Post stated that "while the party's socially conservative wing dominates the Senate, voters have elected moderate Republicans as governor in liberal bastions such as Massachusetts, New York, Rhode Island, Connecticut and Vermont, underlining a paradox of northeastern Republicanism. "Republicans can still do remarkably well in state elections in the Northeast where a lot of the national issues that alienate the region from the party

It is this dichotomy, one of liberal republicanism, that the ocean state constituency has not let go of ... and if history tells us anything, we are not about to,

What will the ballot look like on Tuesday?

State Questions

1. AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES - Casino in West Warwick to be privately owned by a Rhode Island established entitiy by the Narragansett Indian Tribe and its chosen power.

Approval of this amendment to the Rhode Island Constitution will authorize the construction of a resort casino in West Warwick, to be privately owned and operated in association with the Narragansett Indian Tribe.

2. AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE (ELECTIONS - RESTORATION OF VOTING RIGHTS)

Approval of this amendment to the Rhode Island Constitution will permit felons to vote after they are released from prison. Convicted felons currently cannot vote until they have completed their probation

(BUDGET RESERVE ACCOUNT)

Approval of this amendment to the Rhode Island Constitution will increase the funding of the budget reserve account, also known as "the rainy day fund", by limiting the amount of estimated revenues that can be appropriated, increasing the cap on the reserve account, and limiting the use of capital funds to capital projects.

4.HIGHER EDUCATION BONDS

Approval of this question will allow for the State of Rhode Island to issue general obligation bonds, refunding bonds, and temporary notes in an amount not to exceed \$65,000,000 for the construction of a new college of pharmacy building at the University of Rhode Island and \$7,790,000 for renovations to the former Department of Children, Youth and Families facilities at Rhode Island College.

5.TRANSPORTATION BONDS

Approval of this question will allow for the State of Rhode Island to issue general obligation bonds, refunding bonds, and temporary notes in an amount not to exceed \$80,000,000 to match federal funds, provide direct funding for improvements to the state's highways, roads and bridges; \$7,000,000 to provide funding for commuter rail, and \$1,500,000 to purchase and/or rehabilitate buses for the Rhode Island Public Transit Authority's bus fleet.

ROGER WILLIAMS PARK ZOO BONDS

Approval of this question will allow for the State of Rhode Island to issue general obligation bonds, refunding bonds, and temporary notes in an amount not to exceed \$11,000,000 for improvements to the Roger Williams Park Zoo in Providence.

7. FORT ADAMS STATE PARK RECREATION AND RESTORA-TION BONDS

Approval of this question will allow for the State of Rhode Island to 3.AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE issue general obligation bonds, refunding bonds, and temporary notes in an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000 for improvements to the Fort Adams State Park in Newport.

8. DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT BONDS

Approval of this question will allow for the State of Rhode Island to issue general obligation bonds, refunding bonds, and temporary notes in an amount not to exceed \$3,000,000 for the Local Recreation Development Program.

9.AFFORDABLE HOUSING BONDS

\$50,000,000 (Chapter 246 - Public Laws 2006)

Approval of this question will allow for the State of Rhode Island to issue general obligation bonds, refunding bonds, and temporary notes in an amount not to exceed \$50,000,000 for affordable housing.

will be to start a new diplomatic dialogue with those interested [in rebuilding Iraq]," Whitehouse said, adding that the cost of the war is likely to total about 2 trillion

Whitehouse also referred to the rising cost of healthcare, worsening environmental problems and America's dependence on foreign oil as evidence that a shift in the Senate is long overdue.

"What is coming out of DC is a screaming need for change," he said.

According to Whitehouse, the Democrats need to be more aggressive when it comes to making their voices heard. He said that if elected to Senate, he would be vocal, even if Republicans remain the majority.

Whitehouse also touched on education, calling it a "national security issue." He said Pell Grants should be made available to all students and that tuition should be tax-deductible.

Whitehouse discussed the ongoing genocide in Darfur, stressing that US intervention is vital to the nation's recovery. Such an intervention would restore the image of America as a humanitarian nation and an ally. Whitehouse said this image has suffered since the war in Iraq began in

Chafee has spent much of his campaign emphasizing that while he is a Republican, he does not entirely support the current administration's agenda. He was the only Republican to vote against the war in Iraq.

In some ways, Chafee and Whitehouse have similar standpoints on issues such as education, healthcare, and the environment.

Chafee has

contended

Whitehouse would give in to partisan politics if elected.

"When there's any kind of close vote, Sen. Chafee's right in the middle of it," Chafee said in a televised debate October 19. "If Mr. Whitehouse is elected, he'll be a back-bencher and fall into the vast pool of go-along, get along."

According to senior Ellen Messali, an active member of the College Democrats, the upcoming election is one of the most crucial in years.


"Chafee is a likeable Republican, but the Democrats need to take the seat," she said. "The president's power is going unchecked. There is a lot floating through Congress because it's Republican and nobody is touching it. We need a Democratic Senate so they can check the president's power and make sure the next two years aren't like the past six."

According to the results of a Zogby poll released Thursday by Reuters, Whitehouse was 14 points ahead of Chafee. The poll showed that Whitehouse had 53 percent of the vote, while Chafee had 39 percent. The margin of error was plus or minus 4 percentage points.

For election day, Student Affairs has set up transportation to the poles through RIPTA. The shuttle will be leaving every half hour from 12:30 - 7:30 p.m.

According to Vice President of Student Affairs John King, there are also plans to convert the lower commons into an area for students to watch the race on television. Free coffee will be provided. 



With the number of small, privately owned restaurants in the Bristol/Warren area, students may be inundated with the amount of options they are given.

If Roger Williams University students, however, are in the need of a familiar face, they can head to Seekonk, Massachusetts, where restaurant chains are prevalent.

Within a 5-mile radius, Editor in Chief Sarah and I had our choice of dining at the Outback, Bugaboo Creek, TGI Fridays and Vinny T's. We continued up the road a little further and came across my all time favorite restaurant, Pub 99.

We arrived at the restaurant around 5 p.m., and it was not crowded at all. While that may have been because it was Halloween night, the dining area was spacious enough so even if it had been crowded, we would not have been cramped.

To begin with, we ordered popcorn and cheese and crackers, two appetizers that are free of charge. For a meal, Sarah ordered the Sampler, which was a mix of potato skins and chicken tenders for \$8.50. I ordered the Buffalo Chicken Salad, but instead of buffalo sauce, I asked for chipotle sauce. I also asked for my salad to come without peppers and onions. It cost \$8.75.

We did, however, see a heating truck pull up in front of the restaurant as we were leaving, so they may have been having technical difficulties with the heating system.

Overall, our experience at the Pub 99 was excellent. Like I said before, the "Pub" is my favorite restaurant to visit at home in Holden, MA, so it brought back a sense of nostalgia.

Rhode Island: a star is born

Picture Steve Carell strolling through Providence. It's a weird image. The 40year-old virgin and Rhode Island seem about as natural a mix as Paris Hilton and a music career. What would possibly bring one of America's biggest stars to the small-

The answer is Dan in Real Life, a romantic comedy in which Carell plays Dan Burns, a widower who falls in love with his brother's girlfriend. The equally hilarious Dane Cook plays Carell's brother Mitch and Juliette Binoche plays Marie, the woman caught in the middle.

I plan to see this movie for two reasons. The first is to witness Carell and Cook, two of the most sought after and brilliantly funny comedians in America, work together. The second reason is that the entire movie is being shot in Rhode Island—even the early scenes, which are actually set in New Jersey. That means Carell and Cook are now our neighbors, at least until filming wraps in December.

I have been on constant watch for the stars since they arrived in the Ocean State last month. When I walk into a crowded room, I carefully inspect every face for signs of fame. And when I drive to school each morning, I pay extra attention to who is inside the more expensive cars on the

road

My behavior might seem extreme maybe even creepy and intrusive—but living among celebrities isn't something to be blase about. It feels good to know that major stars are just down the street, enduring the same cold weather, flipping through the same local TV stations and sharing the same general space.

Carell and Cook have plenty of celebrity company, though. Dan is just one of several big-budget projects being filmed in Rhode Island this year. Hollywood is making its mark in Providence, Newport and virtually everywhere in between.

Rhode Island was the backdrop last summer for *Underdog*, a Disney movie set to hit theaters this spring. A film crew took over downtown Providence for several months to shoot the film about a dog with superpowers. Jason Lee provides the voice of the dog, and Jim Belushi and Patrick Warburton are also featured in the film.

A movie with more serious subject matter wrapped in Providence last month. The Education of Charlie Banks chronicles the life of a Vassar College student in the '70s. The movie was actually shot at Brown University. Go figure. The film features Jesse Eisenberg as Charlie, Jason Ritter as Mick and Fred Durst—yes, the Limp Bizkit one—as Danny.

Bristol got a bit of the spotlight several weeks ago when the cast and crew of Evening shot some scenes on the lush, sprawling grounds of Mount Hope Farm. The film, set to debut late next year, centers around a dying woman who spends her final days reflecting on her youth. The movie features Vanessa Redgrave as the dying woman, Claire Danes as her young counterpart, and Meryl Streep, Toni Collette and Glenn Close in supporting roles.

A white Victorian house in Tiverton, nestled at the top of a hill overlooking Mount Hope Bay, serves as the main setting for *Evening*. White trailers and trucks shuttled the actors and a lot of clunky equipment up and down the usually quiet street for about two weeks in late September. The set shined like a beacon at

night, illuminated by massive, blinding lights. Drivers headed north over the Sakonnet River Bridge got incredible views of the hill, which was constantly engulfed in a blazing white glow.

Rhode Island has also made its way onto the small screen as the setting for two new shows. Brotherhood, a Showtime drama about crime and politics in Providence, was just picked up for a second season. But Waterfront, a CBS midseason replacement starring Joe Pantoliano as the mayor of Providence, was axed by the network last month before the first episode even aired.

The surge in movie and television production is undoubtedly due to Rhode Island's tax incentives which make it cheap to produce programs within the state. But Rhode Island also has a lot to offer geographically—from historic mansions and untouched countryside, to bustling cities and scenic coastlines. Film crews have convenient access to nearly any setting imaginable.

Hollywood has undeniably discovered the Ocean State and brought with it lights, cameras and a lot of action. Always be ready for your close-up. And if you know where I can find Carell or Cook, have your people call my people.



The new Decemberists album uses beautifully crafted lyrics to complement a variety of instruments that any listener can connect with and enjoy. For those that have never heard of The Decemberists, they are an experimental band with roots in classic pop and folk forms as well as klezmer - Jewish folk music - Irish jig, sea chantey, and progressive rock that debuted in 2003. They have made strides to become a touchstone in the Indie rock steam and with this album they will be catapulted to the forefront.

The idea to write the lyrics to The Crane Wife came from the venerable Japanese folk tale The Crane Wife that has been handed down in countless variations and translations through the centuries (as venerable folk tales are wont to do), the deceptively simple story has stayed with Colin Meloy, the band's lead singer and primary songwriter, ever since he read it several years ago.

Though death, war, greed, and murder enshroud the album's thematic framework, The Crane Wife is a resounding celebration of life. No matter how dark the words may get, the album's spirit is buoyed by boundless energy and an expansive musical vocabulary. Styles and influences abound shades of Pink Floyd, Yes, and Fairport Convention trade off with more anthemic touchstones like middle-period R.E.M., The Waterboys, and even early U2 - but the sound of The Decemberists is unique in contemporary pop music.

Some perks of buying the actual disc is the bonus eleventh track, After the Bombs, and the CD also comes with a digital booklet that has all the songs' lyrics and artwork to compliment the CD. So go check out the new Decemberists album The Crane Wife and expose yourself to some new music.







Swimming: Men win, women lose against Bryant College

The men's swimming and diving team improved to 2-0 on the season as they defeated Bryant 145-80. The Hawks won nine of thirteen events to seal the victory.

The Hawks opened the day by winning the 400-yard medley relay (4:09.49) with the team of Justin Leary, Chris Anderson, Andy Hedden and Davide Giardini. Anderson was an individual double winner for the second straight meet as he won the 200-yard IM (2:14.69) and the 200-yard breast (2:24.50).

Alden Clark sprinted to victory in the 50-yard free (23.63), while Jon Galuska won the 1000-yard free (11:31.54). Mike Faustine won the 500-yard free (5:36.58) and Justin Leary won the 200-yard free (1:55.67). In diving, Casey Swanson won the one-meter and Joe Mello took the three-meter.

The women's loss dropped the team to 1-1 this season as they lost to Bryant 129-98. Despite winning just four events, the Hawks were able to keep it close with their depth.

Cara Naylor won both the one-meter and three-meter diving events to pace the Hawks. Naylor scored 201.68 in the onemeter and 180.90 in the three meter. Kaitlyn Friedrich won the 200-yard fly (2:30.30)

In the meet's final event, Libby Renner, Casey Meagher, Brigid Houlihan and Alison Baker combined to win the 400-yard free relay.

The men and women travel to Wheaton College on Saturday.

Men and women advance to CCC championship

"Oh my God!" screamed a member on the bench of the RWU women's soccer team as a Gordon College pass squirted through the defense. The ball was headed toward an open Gordon forward with just 19 seconds left on the clock.

Ahead 1-0, RWU had clamped down defensively, allowing no shots in the latter part of the second half. But Gordon had finally found a way to get its chance.

While freshman goalkeeper Jen Garside raced toward the left post, Gordon's forward was unable to get a solid foot on the ball, which was now rolling toward the net.

Garside pounced on the ball, securing the victory and a trip to the CCC Championship Game.

As the horn sounded and the players cleared the bench to rush their teammates, the "Oh my God"s were no longer screamed in desperation, but now in celebration.

The team advances to the title game for just the third time in RWU women's soccer's 15-year history.

The Fighting Scots of Gordon controlled the ball for much of the first half, but could not generate a scoring opportunity. Likewise, the Hawks struggled to land a good shot on net, and the game went into halftime in a scoreless tie.

After 28 scoreless minutes in the second half, freshman sensation Amanda DaCunha was able to slip a shot past Gordon goaltender Abby Ytzen. The shot deflected off Ytzen's hand and the post, but found its way across the line. The goal marked the second time this year that DaCunha scored the lone goal in a matchup against Gordon.

Playing with the lead, the Hawks went into lockdown mode. Each time the Scots pushed the ball into RWU's zone, it came flying out twice as fast as it came in. As the time ticked off the clock, the Scots' attempts to force the ball into tight areas became more and more hopeless.

However, Gordon got their chance, but Garside came through with the save – just her second of the game.

The Hawks move on to the CCC Championship Game, which takes place this Saturday at Endicott College. The Hawks hope to stop the Gulls from winning their fourth straight CCC Championship.

The men's game had an equal amount of suspense in its closing minutes on Thursday, as RWU clung to a 2-1 lead.

Playing at North Campus due to the poor field conditions at Bayside Field, Brendan Cavanaugh got the scoring started in the eleventh minute.

The Fighting Scots came back however, getting a goal from senior Christopher Dull in the 29th minute.

The teams headed into halftime tied at one goal apiece.

The Hawks caught a break early in the second half as Gordon's Garrett Nanni beat goalkeeper Kevin Deegan on a shot, but the ball bounced off the post.

As they battled back and forth, getting muddier by the minute, neither team could
