In the recent past, the conference was held at Cornell, Cal-Hastings, Tulane, Cal-Davis, Hawaii, and Michigan, and it was brought to RWU because of the good works of two of my RWU colleagues who specialize in Comp Law, <u>Prof. Ed Eberle</u> and <u>Prof.</u> <u>Louise Ellen Teitz</u>.
