I am fortunate that at some point I decided to give the FS test a try. It worked out for me and now I have what has to be one of the best jobs in the world.


I am the General Services Officer in the "Mountain Kingdom" of Lesotho in Southern Africa, so my job is to run many of the support elements of the embassy that allow the real diplomacy to take place. That position puts me in charge of housing, which means I have to negotiate and sign leases for all of our houses, and I am the safety and health officer, so I am often required to draft polices, memos, and reports. I have been pleasantly surprised by how often I find that my RWU legal training has helped me sort through challenging

situations.

The Capitol Maseru itself has been a soft landing for us. It is a small post with a bunch of young families. My commute on a heavy traffic day is about 5 minutes so I don't have to waste so much of my time as I did in Washington. The walk to the golf course takes only a few minutes, and 9 holes only cost \$7. This being Africa, even the coldest winter days warm up enough in the late morning to take in 9 holes. And the hiking here in the mountains is

phenomenal. All in all, I can say that being an FSO is a pretty great experience. I feel extremely fortunate.

Although I have another year here in Lesotho, I just received our onward assignment. The family and I are all headed to Moscow in 2014, after a year of Russian language immersion. We are all pretty psyched.
