## Career Resources

In addition to the resources of the Office of Career Services, the Law Library's career collection contains a variety of materials for career exploration. The career collection is located adjacent to Training Lab 2. Of note is a recent acquisition *Career Opportunities in Law and the Legal Industry* (Career, KF297 .E24 2007). In this second edition, the author profiles 107 jobs. For each job, there is a description of the salary range, employment prospects, job requirements, and job duties. There are profiles of employment opportunities for attorneys (e.g. private practice, corporate, etc.), judges, alternative dispute resolution practitioners, legal and litigation support professionals, litigation consultants and expert witnesses, court support staff, educators, librarians and information specialists, communications professionals, managers and administrators, analysts and examiners, and even professions in politics. *Beyond the Big Firm: Profiles of Lawyers Who Want Something More* (Career, KF299 .P8 M67 2007) contains profiles of lawyers working in the area of civil liberties, employment law, environmental law, personal injury, and human rights law. Additional profiles include those working as prosecutors and defense counsel and those employed by federal/state government, non-profit organizations, and small law firms.


For those of you considering a career in international law, *Careers in International Law: A Guide to Career Paths and Internships in International Law* (Career K115

.C47 2005/06) contains essays by practitioners and academics offering insight into numerous practice areas. There is advice on networking and a listing of internship opportunities. *Careers in International Law, Second Edition* (Career, KZ1238.U5 C37 2001) is a collection of essays by practitioners about their careers. Representative careers are in business, commercial arbitration, trade, environmental law, humanitarian law, admiralty, transactional law, criminal law, and academia.

Two great publications to read if you are interested in public service work are *Serving the Public: A Job Search Guide* (Career, KF299 .P8 P83) and *International Public Interest Law: A Guide to Opportunities in the United States and Abroad* (Career, K118 .P82 P83 2002). An annual publication of the Bernard Koteen Office of Public Interest Advising of the Harvard Law School, *Serving the Public* is a two volume guide which covers public service work in the United States and abroad. There are discussions of the types of public interest settings and practices. A joint project of Harvard and Yale law schools, *International Public Interest Law: A Guide to Opportunities in the United States and Abroad* (Career, K118 .P82 P83 2002) contains personal narratives by lawyers and law students describing their work experiences in international public interest law.

Externships offer a wonderful opportunity to explore various careers in the law. An informative publication is *Learning From Practice: A Professional Develop-*

*ment Text for Legal Externs*, 2d ed. (Career, KF300. O38 2007). Several chapters are devoted to ethical issues and the development of lawyering skills. There is also a chapter on judicial clerkships.
