Dear Mr. Vincent:

It was a great pleasure to beable to again aqquaint myself with the Vincent House. For 18 years I have been involved with the life and future of "old Houses" consequently I have personally become familiar with numerous structures. Most of these have been exciting, some portion of the past still in evidence. Few, however, have come anywhere near the superb quality of the 300 years still very much evident in the Vincent House. The integral growth of the past has not been ripped out and substituted with the plastic of the present.

The reasons for saving this building and giving it back to the people of Martha's Vineyard are many ... not only because it is perhaps the oldest surviving structure on the island but the 300 years of it's existence have been preserved with the best of each period and these periods are well represented. The hewn and exposed frame of the 17th century, raised panelling of the 18th century and the Federal treatment of the late 18 to early 19th century. The very soul of the structure which speaks for its-self and all the Vineyard people who have had their time to be part of it. In addition the very material incorperated into this living structure ... has come directly from the Island land.

All these aspects must be considered and then related to land conservation and the real meaning behind those words. Land gave the materials for man to use -- to create his shelter. In turn, man's use was with dignity and humility towards the nature of the material ... relating back again to our earth and what we can take from it with honesty. The Vincent House is a growth perpetuated by real people's needs.

It is most rewarding to our heritage that the Edgartown Conservation Commission is considering the preservation of this house. Following is an estimate of the costs involved in the re-location of the Vincent House. The principal expense will be in preparation for the move and the move its'self.

I hope this will be of some value to you. I am having difficulty getting the figure to 100,000.00 but it certainly is worth keeping in mind as there will be landscaping, security, etc. to think about.

# Repair b sic structure for moving:

Chimney - replace all weakened bricks with identical material.

Point and plaster where necessary to make the chimney structurally sound for move and after.

Sills - all the sills and joist are not visable at this time.

If 100% replacement was necessary which would include some repairs to up-right members and minor repairs involving the exterior where related to the sills.
