Thank you for your very interesting letter.  
I shall reply briefly at once, long hand,  
though you will see at once why I prefer  
to have my letters typed. At age 94, I can  
no longer type, nor hold a pen properly.  
I usually mail my scribbles to my  
secretary in Dedham, who types and mails  
them back. In the future I will treat  
our correspondence that way. (Really can  
spell, but have difficulty seeing what I write).

First, I must explain that your letter  
arrives first as I am confronted with two  
other projects simultaneously, so please ex-

childhood on. (I am the last of five siblings,  
and the eldest!)

Also, I have not written a history of the  
Vose family. That was done beautifully by  
the late (very late) Miss Ellen S. Vose of  
Stoughton "Robert Vose and His Descendants"
