Norrinda Brown Hayat, Associate Professor of Law at Fordham Law School, will be a guest lecturer in the Race and Foundations of American Law Course.

Professor Hayat is an Associate Professor at Fordham Law School. Her scholarship focuses on the intersection of race, gender and access to housing and law and has been placed or is forthcoming in the *California Law Review*, the *Brooklyn Law Review*, the *NYU Journal of Law and Social Change*, the *Michigan Journal of Race and Law*, and the *Clinical Law Review* among others. She is a recognized expert on housing law issues and has written op-eds and been interviewed for various news outlets, including the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, *Shelterforce* and the *New Jersey Star-Ledger*. Prior to law teaching, Professor Hayat spent almost a decade in government practice at the United States Department of Justice in the Civil Rights Division as a trial attorney advocating on behalf of victims of housing discrimination. She is engaged in professional service on various committees, including sitting on the Executive Committee of the Clinical Section of the American Association of Law Schools (AALS). Professor Hayat was awarded the Junior Faculty of the Year award by the Society of American Law Teachers (SALT) in 2021. Professor Hayat earned her B.A. from Dartmouth College and her J.D. from University of Virginia School of Law.
